Footfall for the last few months

July saw us host a storytelling event as part of the Folk Festival and then later in the month we had 15 visitors as part of Enable Summer School.

August saw 2 days of children's art workshops which were well attended. The lacemakers were back demonstrating in the museum on the 17th and on Harbour Day we saw over 600 people watch mackerel smoking in the outdoor courtyard.

September we again took part in Aberdeenshire Doors Open Days weekend and on the last Saturday of the month we hosted a creative writing workshop.

In August we saw one of our biggest daily totals ever with 1151 people visiting the museum and courtyard! Our figures for 2024 are good but due to some disappointingly poor weather we are slightly down on 2023 figures. The figures highlighted in grey below were months when we had Covid restrictions in place.

James Finlayson (1887 - 1953)

It is always interesting to read about people, who either were born in Stonehaven, or have strong family connections. In 1990, the Heritage Society published a book by Archie Watt entitled 'A Goodly Heritage' about famous people of Stonehaven and district. Apart from the Barclays of Urie, Robert Burns' ancestors and James Leslie Mitchell, many were a bit obscure and there were only a handful from the 20th century.

I have found details of one man who probably would have not made Archie's book. Isabella Henderson was born in a house on the High Street, Stonehaven on 19 August 1861, daughter of James Henderson, Ship Master and his wife Isabella ,whose maiden name was Wood. James would have been the owner or joint owner of one of the ships which plied from Stonehaven, carrying potatoes and cereals , and also coal, so would have been a prosperous businessman. When she was 18, Isabella married Alex Finlayson, a Blacksmith in Larbert, Stirlingshire and her son James Henderson Finlayson was born there on 27 August 1887.



James started working life as a tinsmith, probably for his father, but he obviously had other talents and became an actor, first appearing on stage at the Theatre Royal in Edinburgh. He must have been talented as he got the chance to travel to America and worked first in New York before moving on to Hollywood. He found film work including the Keystone Cops silent films and found success when he signed with Hal Roach working with Stan Laurel and Oliver Hardy. He became an indispensable part of the Laurel and Hardy team, appearing in 33 of their films, usually as a villain or antagonist. His trademarks were a large fake moustache, double take and fade away head reaction and the expression 'd'oooooh'. 60 years later, this phrase became famous when used by Homer Simpson in the cartoon series 'The Simpsons'.

I assume James would have visited his grandfather James Henderson in Stonehaven ,and $\,$ perhaps sailed in one of his ships. It is fascinating to have a connection between our small town and one of the greatest comedy duos of the 20^{th} Century.
